

PRACTICAL ARTIST

How are performers surviving the pandemic? All over the world, the entertainment business including theaters, cinemas, concert halls and event venues has been hit hard.

Philip Modinos, class of '97, the largest private producer in Greece and second largest overall only to the National Opera, is adapting to the new realities that face the performing arts industry.

"I had a monopoly from 2015 until 2019 in Thessaloniki and Larisa. In 2020, I was due to work for 3 months at the Royal Opera House Covent Garden, covering three lead roles, as well as a large tour producing and singing in Germany. It was likely that more would have happened after that. In the past, I have worked as an artist doing leads for Greek National Opera, National Orchestra in Athens and Thessaloniki, the Athens Festival and abroad. In 2011 I was awarded the Wagner Association Prize for competitions.

I was the financial director of the Larisa Symphony Orchestra (LSO) from 2016 until 2018 and I'm currently moving to create a non-profit organization in support of fair treatment of artists in Greece. This isn't so much driven by the latest "Me Too" type scandals which have emerged, but by other issues which we've all had to face in the art world: mainly payment issues and equal opportunities.

As a company we've held some charity events for various organizations. At some point we even donated some of our ticket income to "Theageneio" in Thessaloniki for Cancer Research. My wife and I are both honorary members of Rotary in Thessaloniki (who deals very much with meningitis). I've also been connected for years to Life Action Trust in London, who deal with a variety of causes. I've done many concerts for them and assisted them in other ways as well.

Right now, future goals are fuzzy. It all really depends on how long the pandemic will last. Therefore, in the meantime, I'm attempting new things. I've been learning how to code (html, php, python) and I have to say, the English and the keyboarding are real corner stones to that. I've also recently looked into working with TV and Film, although I'm not sure if I'm going to see that through, and I've also gone into real estate.

My education at ACS Athens was from 10th to 12th grade (1994-1997). I was in Greek Public School before that and in German School up until the 6th grade but was sent to ACS because my parents felt



that the Greek Public School system wasn't offering me the opportunities that a place like ACS could. And if one considers that most kids who went to Greek School spent their entire day outside of school paying for private lessons, in the end the amount of money spent on schooling ended up being the same.

At ACS there were many valuable lessons, but what turned out to be the most valuable for me was English (which I had the fortune of doing at IB level) and (believe it or not) keyboarding (as in blind touch typing). Those were two skills that ACS cultivated in me which I ended up using greatly and daily in my life.

After ACS I had a long break from formal education. I had a lot to work out, and did Martial Arts and became a Martial Arts teacher for a while. Then, in 2004 I got accepted to a Bachelor's degree at Trinity College of Music in London to study singing and later

Piano and Conducting. I completed the course in 2008 and in 2011. I went back to London, this time to the Royal Academy of Music under scholarship from the Onassis Foundation for a one-year Master in Arts.

I didn't receive any recognition whilst at ACS, but, also I wasn't looking for any. Like I said, I had a lot to work out, and, in some ways, I'm still doing that, but back then I was switching between being introverted and extroverted. I was ranked 54 out of 200 or something like that... that flustered some of my peers who were ranked about the same, but actually spent the entire time at ACS studying hard. So, our ranking was about the same, but I wasn't making as much of an effort as I perhaps should have. In retrospect, I wish I would've made more of an effort back then, I had only myself to blame. Perhaps then I would've been ranked in the top 10. But, I'm still really happy I went there and experienced everything I did.







Family

My parents were both very successful opera singers. John Modenos and Jenny Drivala. My father passed away in 2011. My mother is still very well and she continues to sing every now and again, making an effort to stay in shape even now in her later years. I have a daughter from my previous marriage, and am currently married to Kassandra Dimopoulou, who is also my partner (in crime) in most of our business ventures. Everything I have accomplished in the last few years has been in partnership with her.

I've been very grateful to see that friends from ACS have maintained a certain amount of loyalty, to the extent that is possible. We kept meeting after graduation and I've had the great fortune that my good friends Stelios Fragos and Alexi Papaconstantinou (ranked #1 I think in our class) let me stay at their place in London a few times, including the time I auditioned for the Royal Opera House. It wasn't as much financial, as it was to have friendly faces during some difficult ventures in London. I cherish the existence of these bonds more and more as I grow older.

"As for words of wisdom for the next generation, here it is: There are three things in this life that you will need to learn well, no matter what you study. Those things are (in order):

1 Accounting and Taxes

2 Law and legal procedure (How to file a lawsuit for example)

3 Politics

I don't care if you're becoming a rocket scientist, a clarinet player or a professional Lacrosse cheerleader. You will need to learn those three things... or you'll be pushed to the side by those who know them better than you. Make it a point to have as much friction and interaction with those things and you will see that your life will be better. Avoid them, doesn't matter the excuse, and you will be beaten by your competitors and adversaries who have a better understanding of these things. "

My name is Eva-Maria Alexandra Panagiotou (but I go by Alexandra), and I

am a wildlife conservationist, educator and rehabilitator from Athens, Greece. I moved to South Africa last year. I have a MSc in Conservation Science and Policy, and a BSc in Natural Resources Conservation with a specialization in Wildlife Conservation and Ecology. Over the years I have had the honor of working for many different organizations around the world, primarily as a wildlife rehabilitator and an environmental educator.

However, my most recent work and research has involved sea turtles, a species I am very passionate about working with and protecting. There are seven sea turtle species of which three species are critically endangered, two are endangered, one is threatened, and one has an unknown conservation status. Why do I mention this? Sea turtles are ocean ambassadors, they play an important part of the planet's food web, and the maintain the health of the world's oceans.



So what? Healthy oceans are vital for the wellbeing of our planet and all its inhabitants, including humans. Healthy oceans help regulate climate and reduce climate change impacts. Additionally, ocean currents distribute heat across the globe, which aids in regulating temperatures and weather. The ocean also absorbs over 90% of the heat and approximately 30% of carbon dioxide emissions produced by human activities. Moreover, the ocean provides millions of livelihoods, particularly in developing countries, that stimulate local and global economies, and it provides a vast array of recreational opportunities that help the coastal and marine tourism industry.

Also, if you like breathing, scientists estimate that 50-80% of the oxygen production on Earth comes from the ocean (pretty important if you ask me!).

And those are just some reasons why healthy oceans are important. So, the main way I have decided to help protect our oceans is through researching, caring, rehabilitating and raising awareness about sea turtles.



On March 1, 2021, Ms. Foteini (Fay) Pazartzis was elected the new Chair of the Human Rights Committee of the United Nations, a two year term of office from March 2021 to March 2023.

Fay was born in Athens and studied at the Department of Public Law of the Law School of the National Kapodistrian University of Athens. She holds a Master of Arts degree in International Law as well as a PhD, both from the University of Paris.

She is a professor of International Law at the Law School of the National and Kapodistrian University of Athens, and President of the Department of International Studies of the school as well as coordinator of the postgraduate program of International and European Studies. In 2014, Fay was elected to the Human Rights Committee of the United Nations, re-elected in 2018 for a second term and named Vice President soon after.

In September 2019, Fay became President of the European Society of International Law (ESIL). She is also the President of the Greek branch of the International Law Association. She is also a member of the Hellenic Society of International Law and International Relations, the Société Française pour le Droit International and the American Society of International Law.

Fay has also served as: Rapporteur of the United Nations Commission on Human Rights, Chairman of the Working Group of the United Nations Commission on Human Rights for the Rules of Procedure, Visiting Partner at the Lauterpacht Research Center for International Law, University of Cambridge, and Director of Studies of the French Department of Public International Law at the Academy of International Law in The Hague, among other appointments. She is the author of numerous articles and books in Greek, English, and in French.

Her diverse and multidimensional scientific background, dedication to the academic and research field of international law, and her many years of international service are all sure to contribute to the development an upgrading of this international body. Congratulations!






