

MARCA DALEY: LETTER TO STEVE

Marca Daley and Steve Medeiros arrived at ACS Athens around the same time, in the early 1980s. Both young educators in a new country, they quickly became close friends as well as colleagues - a friendship that lasted through the next few decades, and beyond their respective retirements just a few years ago. We're very grateful to Marca for sharing her thoughts on their friendship, and for reflecting the thoughts and words of some of the very many people who profoundly benefitted from Steve's dedication to students, friends and staff at ACS.

Dear Steve,

It's November, a year since your passing, a year of conscious reminiscences, and a year of memories that surface unbidden as I walk the trails and beaches of the Cape, a place you knew so well and loved so much. As Walt Whitman would say, our common love of the Cape is one of the 'gossamer threads' that binds our souls (yes, still!); other threads were our shared experiences in all walks of our lives in Athens and at ACS.

When I was asked to write this tribute/article for The Owl, I was not at all certain that I could. But then I began to read thoughts and memories of so many of us... your friends, colleagues, and students...all bound to you by 'gossamer threads' and so, bound to each other, by our memories of you and what you have meant to each one of us.

You were a light, a generous spirit, a role model, a mentor; you were our teacher, confidant, best friend, and as one of us wrote, 'a living paradigm, an angel on earth!' As I write, I



realize that the voice on the page needs to be voices; not mine alone, but ours. And so, here they are, from across miles and years, and even generations (another theme in Whitman's poetry).

A colleague wrote, "Steve, you are the light in the room wherever you stand; your generous spirit allows those who stand near to be enlightened." A student/colleague wrote "your light, love and teachings will live on in all of us who knew you" and another that "the light you shared with all of us will continue to glow." Yet another wrote of your "wonderfully open mind, and incredibly generous spirit which raised up everyone around you in a seemingly effortless way." There are threads here, gossamer threads. Weren't you the one to teach us to tease out the threads in literary commentary, in Humanities, in TOK, or in our own writing?

One colleague captured all our thoughts and feelings in a single sentence: "Steve, I have never met and will never meet such an $\alpha\nu\theta\rho\omega\pi$ o." Ah, Steve, you were so much to so many of us, but most of all you were our teacher; and here,



some lasting memories of the qualities we admired in you; and of your influence on us and the lives we have lived.

- -You were one of those people who dropped a golden seed in our hearts and taught us to think, to dream, and to be better people.
- -Your intellect, humility, humor, and kindness blew me away and I wanted so much to be like you.
- -You were a teacher in the truest sense of the word, and possessed the ceaseless patience of a saint.
- -You motivated me, challenged me, and always supported me. You were always right there; not always visible but there, and this gave me immense strength.
- -You taught me to see the beauty and importance of expression. Your love for teaching and learning was so pure and clear.
- -You have shown me what it means to be thoughtful; the seemingly imperceptible yet astronomical difference between looking at 'the big picture' and thinking about 'the whole.'
- -You are and always will be a teacher, my teacher ... someone who could see beyond your students' years and invest in the people they could become. Your faith in us, and in multiple generations of your students, is an enduring lesson that we must have faith in others.
- -In the face of nagging impermanence and a world riddled with strife, you gifted me and our class with the joy of exquisite discovery of the world and of ourselves. You knew time, mortality and love would continue to weave and tangle themselves thru each individual day and this lesson would be our wings.

Steve, you transformed us. In our written thoughts, many of us focused on the transformation of our lives through the example of your own, and your teachings of what it is that makes us human. You taught us to listen, to

question, to think deeply and critically, to open our minds and widen our worlds, to give respectful attention to others, to take risks, to experience joy, to make our world a better place...



And you O my soul where you stand, Surrounded, detached, in measureless oceans of space, Ceaselessly musing, venturing, throwing, seeking the spheres to connect them, Till the bridge you will need be form'd, till the ductile anchor hold, Till the gossamer thread you fling catch somewhere, O my soul.

MORE VOICES


-You knew that more could be accomplished with careful listening and tough questions, and you always sought the best in each of us.

-You always made me feel like my voice was being heard, Steve. Your attentive listening, support, and sympathetic disposition helped me keep perspective.



-Our world is better for having you in it. You will always be a light for so many of us. I want to tell you that all over the globe, right at this moment, those people whose minds you have shaped and moulded are now unified in loving you.

-I hope you feel the love and respect of a global network of the students you taught, mentored and befriended at ACS. We do not gather in person but we gather together nonetheless, united by memories whose details may have faded over the years, but whose lessons endure across time and space.

Again I turn to Whitman: "It avails not, time nor place -- distance avails not," and I imagine you responding with his next line: "I am with you, you men and women of a generation, or ever so many generations hence," Crossing Brooklyn Ferry I can even hear your voice--your voice as you used to read from Whitman (or Wordsworth, or Keats, or Frost) and I'm lost for a moment in memories that have surfaced unbidden...

Steve, thus far, the voices I have shared with you are ACS voices, but there are others whose lives you profoundly touched also. You modeled for us just how one could make the world a better place through your passionate work and leadership with Democrats Abroad Greece. Two of your colleagues from DAGR also wrote to share their thoughts.

-When a friend and colleague dies young (63?), you think long and hard about memory. Steve had been a pillar of my community, the stable, infinitely sensible and unselfish core of Democrats Abroad Greece. Guessing, as we did not, how little time was left to him, he willingly sacrificed that time for his colleagues and community. Forgetting him is not an option. ... This morning, at the memorial to Steve Medeiros at the Athens First Cemetery, I saw a crowd of people large enough and loving enough to make me think memory is not safely entrusted to stonecutters, but instead to the people we leave behind us, the ones whose lives Steve worked selflessly to change for the better. -It comes as no surprise that Steve died on the eve of the Feast of Angels here in Greece. Steve was truly an earth angel--an easy going, patient man, tolerant of all, a leader who always held everyone as an equal in both deed and thought. ,,, His legacy lives on in his learners - his students, his colleagues, his friends, and his family. Steve, when you left us last year, we were not prepared for the leave-taking. What I mean is, we knew that your leave-taking was imminent, but were not ready for ours. Our goodbyes came later, at different times and in different settings. Physically, some of us were very near to you, and others of us oceans apart. I want to share what two colleagues wrote of their leave-takings.

-There are only spots of color left in the forest now. Last week a big storm stripped the branches of most

of the remaining leaves. The bare trunks let in more light now. I wade through knee high drifts of brown leaves remembering how as kids we used to jump into the carefully raked mounds, shrieking with laughter.

This is the perfect place to reflect and to remember my irreplaceable friend who so deeply and in such profound ways touched my experience and influenced my life.

-I am bewildered by the decline in the unfolding of events; awestruck of his power--that even if the body may be wasting and ravaged, his quiet presence still holds the strength to make me a better person. How his gentility and civility, his delightful company is here to teach me yet, a new lesson. I am humbled both by his tenacity and his fragility, anticipating with foreboding the hollow of his absence...what Pico Iyer refers to "the suprasensory porousness to life "...And how not by purpose nor intent, he has given me a chance to bear witness to one of life's most profound moments.

And finally, Steve, my own leave-taking. It happened on your birthday, in February, when I thought that I wouldn't be communicating with you; but it was a Whitman experience. Of course.

I walked one of my favorite walks, The Atlantic White Cedar Swamp down at the site of the old Marconi Station in Wellfleet. We passed by on our way to your wedding in Provincetown on that glorious and freezing New Year's Day! I'd been thinking of you and Tony and our friendship practically the whole hike ... high on the ocean bluffs as I gazed out over the fogshrouded sea; as I walked the pine needlecovered paths; and into the rich silence of the swamp itself.

As I returned from the 9-km hike, I took a path that I hardly ever take. There, on a bench by the side of the woods, was a plastic container. In it, a small notebook, a pen, and a card with a line from Walt Whitman's poem "Crossing Brooklyn Ferry" - Who knows, for all the distance, but I am as good as looking at you now, for all you cannot see me?

Now what would you think? One of your (and my) favorite poets in one of my favorite places, on your birthday... Walt Whitman, the Transcendentalist who believed that we can all transcend time and place and space...

Steve, I have never tried to make sense of this experience; just consider it one of the many 'gossamer threads' that binds our souls. But as I recall it, I smile. I can hear your voice, watch you speak with your hands, and remember how you always smiled with your eyes and spread joy with your laughter.

We love you and miss you. Until we meet again...

'Greek team' in US Congress bolstered to six

The Greek voice in the United States Congress has been strengthened even further, while at the same time becoming more gender balanced with the addition of one more woman, who is a Republican, thus making the "team" more politically diverse too.

Tuesday's polls saw the re-election of the five members of the diaspora who already sat in the House of Representatives, while their total number was increased to six after the successful candidacy of one more Greek American.

More specifically, Democrat John Sarbanes from Maryland with 70% of the vote, Charlie Crist from Florida with 53%, Dina Titus from Nevada with 61% and Chris Pappas from New Hampshire with 52% enjoyed relatively easy wins that saw them reclaim their seats in Congress. Along with the four Democrats, two Greek-American representatives of the Republican Party were also elected. Florida's Gus Bilirakis, a steady presence in Congress for many years, was easily re-elected with 63% of the vote, while the "Greek team" was strengthened with the addition of one more Republican, Nicole Malliotakis, who was elected for the first time in her home state of New York, with 58%.

In total, this means that there are six Greek-American representatives in the US Congress who will be able to express the community's concerns not only on domestic issues, but also with respect to the problems, and in some cases threats, that the motherlands of Greece and Cyprus, are facing.



The positive trend in the House of Representatives is, unfortunately, not matched by a similar one in the Senate, where there is no member with Greek roots. There was a time when we had two senators in the upper chamber – both of whom served for many years: Democrat Paul Sarbanes and Republican Olympia Snowe. One only hopes this will change soon.

Still, for the past few years, that vacuum in the US Senate body has been filled very amply and ably by Robert Menendez, who has shown a keen and consistent interest in issues related to Greece and Cyprus.rican president and his administration.

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




